

## How to Obtain a Driver's License

You must have a valid driver's license in order to operate a vehicle in Utah. If you have a permit from your home country, it is only valid for 6 months. To continue driving in Utah legally after this time, you will need to obtain a Utah driver's license.

Obtaining a driver's license or a Utah State Identification Card is recommended because it can also be used as a form of identification in the United States. This means you do not need to carry your passport with you at all times.

## How to Apply for a Driver's License

- 1. Collect the required documents:
  - Unexpired passport with visa inside
  - I-94 document
  - I-20 or DS-2019
  - Social Security card (if you are not eligible, you must obtain a letter from the Social Security office indicating ineligibility)
  - 2 documents that verify your Utah residency and mailing address (these must display your name and address and can be bank statements, rental contract, utility bill, vehicle title, etc.)
  - Proof of driving experience (your home country driver's license or proof that you completed a driver's education course in Utah)
- 2. <u>Schedule an appointment</u> or <u>visit a driver license office</u>. You will need to complete an application, which you can do online or at the office.
- 3. At your appointment, you will need to pass an eye test, have your photo taken, complete a medical questionnaire, and pass a written test and/or driving test.

## How to Apply for a Utah State Identification Card
